<p>Poland has undertaken the following measures which serve implementation of the Convention:</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> – Since 1995 moratorium on production, export and transfers of anti-personnel mines; – Act on business activities in production and trade of explosives, weapons, ammunition, goods and technology for military or police use from 22 June 2001; – Law on foreign trade in goods, technologies and services of strategic importance to the security of the state and to maintaining international peace and security (article 6b. and article 33.1., which introduces penal sanctions) from 29 November 2000; – The Governmental Decree on ban and restriction of transfer of strategic importance goods from 23 November 2004; – Penal code (article 121) implementing international and domestic law concerning, inter alia, penal sanctions of up to ten years of imprisonment for production, accumulation, trade, storage, transport and research of illegal combat materials from 6 June 1997; – Act on health care benefits financed from public funds (the same benefits apply to victims of anti-personnel mines) from 27 August 2004; – Act on the ratification of the “Convention on the prohibition of the use, stockpiling, production and transfer of anti-personnel mines and on their destruction” from 10 October 2012; – Ratification of the “Convention on the prohibition of the use, stockpiling, production and transfer of anti-personnel mines and on their destruction” from 14 December 2012. 	<p>Relevant legal texts are available at www.sejm.gov.pl</p>

<p>Location of destruction sites</p> <p>At the beginning of 2011 Poland started process aiming at destruction of APMs and their components. It included transport of all components to four central storage facilities and determination of technical and organizational requirements. In July 2011 the Military Property Agency awarded a contract to MG Poland Llc company for sale of iron and wooden bodies of majority of APMs as well as their detonator mechanisms in order to permanently deprive them of their usability in the depots where they were stored. In 2012 the company completed its activities.</p> <p>In 2013 remaining APMs and APM components were gathered in five central storage facilities: Drawno, Dunińów, Krapkowice, Osowiec and Sławy where they are awaiting for utilisation. Due to their design they can be destroyed only by detonation. Next year it is planned to choose a proper contractor for destruction of APMs and APM components existing in Military Property Agency inventories.</p>	<p>Methods:</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> - destruction of APMs by detonation by employing a detonation chamber or in isolated and secured area, if a proper contractor fulfilling specific requirements cannot be found; - irreversible damage of APMs components so they can not be used any more for the purpose they were designated and produced; - recycling of the retrieved material. <p>Applicable safety standards</p> <p>The ongoing activities are in compliance with the Polish Labour Act and other particular regulations of the Polish Legal System.</p>

	<p>Applicable environmental standards</p> <p>The disposal process is carried out according to the Polish Act on Environmental Protection which applies all European Union Directives in that matter.</p>

The marking shall at least be to the standards set out in the Protocol on Prohibitions or Restrictions on the Use of Mines, Booby-Traps and Other Devices, as amended on 3 May 1996, annexed to the Convention on Prohibitions or Restrictions on the Use of Certain Conventional Weapons Which May Be Deemed to Be Excessively Injurious or to Have Indiscriminate Effects".
