Madame Co- Chair, Excelencies, Distinguish Participants, Ladies and Centlemen. Let me at the out-set, express Palau's delegation sincere appreciation to the Geneva International Centre for Humanitarian Demining and Donors Group of the Sponsorship Programme for sponsoring my participation in today's meeting in behalf of the Republic of Palau. My island Country is a small nation with very limited resources and without their support it would have been very difficult for metotravel this far to take part in this very important meeting

My island country although very small with only 20,000 people and with the land mass of less than 300 square miles does not have the ability to produce Antipersonnel mines, my country however, attaches great importance to the Convention on the Prohibition of Use, Stockpiling Production and Transfer of Antipersonnel Mines and on Their Destruction (The Ottawa Convention, Mine Ban Treaty).

This is so because as small as small as we are the Republic of Palau was the site of one of the fiercest battle during the World War II in the Pacific and the issue of unexploded or dnances and abandoned explosives are of great concern to Palau. Palau has had its share of victims of abandoned explosives and unexploded or dnance after WWII. Palau believes that there are many unexploded or dnance out in remote terrains of Palau, but does not have the capability to find and safely remove them.

With three-quarters of the world's nations as a State Parties and Signatories make the Otta wa Convention an exceptional international law, and Palau takes notice on this. This is a clear indication of the widespread international rejection of any use of possession of antipersonnel mines. Palau is taking every step to make sure that it will soon, too, join this Convention

Palau is interested in supporting an international humanitarian law addressing the problem of unexploded ordnance and legal obligation for the users of explosive munitions to ensure that civilians come to no harm from the remnants of war.
