PRELIMINARY OBSERVATIONS ON THE IMPLEMENTATION OF ARTICLE 5 BY MAURITANIA

- I. Progress in implementation (OAP Action #22, #8)
- 1. Mauritania reported that in 2023 it identified 6 mined areas measuring 6,846,894 square metres.
- 2. The Committee observed that the information provided by Mauritania on progress in implementation allowed for some comparability with that provided in its 2021 extension request.
- 3. The Oslo Action Plan (OAP) requests States to provide quality information on progress and challenges in implementing the Convention, employing the guide to reporting. The Committee noted the importance of Mauritania reporting by employing the guide to reporting. (Action #8)
- 4. The Committee observed that Mauritania had provided disaggregated information on progress in accordance with land release methodology employed. (Action #22)

II. Clarity regarding remaining challenge (OAP Action #18, 22)

- 5. The Committee observed that Mauritania had provided some clarity¹ on its remaining challenge (Action #18). Mauritania reported a remaining challenge of 22 known or suspected mined areas measuring 22,369,724 square metres. (Action #22)
- 6. The OAP requests States that have not yet done so will identify the precise perimeter of mined areas, to the extent possible, and establish evidence based, accurate baselines of contamination based on information collected from all relevant sources, no later than by the Nineteenth Meeting of the States Parties in 2021. The Committee observed that Mauritania was still in the process of identifying the precise perimeter of mined areas and would welcome updated information from Mauritania on these efforts. (Action #18)
- 7. The OAP requests States to report on having established their baseline through inclusive consultations with women, girls, boys and men. The Committee observed that Mauritania had not provided updated information in its Article 7 Report on its efforts in implementation in this regard and would welcome further information. (Action #18)

III. National plans for clearance and survey (OAP Actions #1, #2, #3, #19, #20, #26)

- 8. The Committee observed that Mauritania in its 2021 extension request had included a plan to survey and more accurately determine the presence of mined areas under its jurisdiction and control The Committee would welcome further information from Mauritania in this regard. (Action #2, #19)
- 9. The OAP requests States to annually update their national work plans based on new evidence and report on adjusted milestones in their Article 7 reports by 30 April each year, including information on the number of areas and amount of mined area to be addressed annually and on how priorities have been established. The Committee observed that Mauritania had not provided updated information in its Article 7 Report on its efforts in implementation in this regard and would welcome further information. (Action #20)
- 10. The OAP requests States to Demonstrate high levels of national ownership, including by integrating Convention implementation activities into national development plans, poverty reduction strategies, humanitarian response plans. The Committee observed that Mauritania had not provided updated information in its Article 7 Report on its efforts in implementation in this regard and would welcome further information. (Action #1)
- 11. The OAP requests States to Demonstrate high levels of national ownership, including by making financial and other commitments to implementation. The Committee observed that Mauritania had not provided updated information in its Article 7 Report on its efforts in implementation in this regard and would welcome further information. (Action #1)
- 12. The OAP requests States to strengthen partnerships and integrate responses between the mine action community and relevant humanitarian, peacebuilding, development and human rights communities, bearing in mind the 2030 Agenda for Sustainable Development. The Committee observed that Mauritania had not provided updated information in its Article 7 Report on its efforts in implementation of Action #6 and would welcome further information in this regard. (Action #6)
- 13. The OAP requests States to ensure that the different needs and perspectives of women, girls, boys and men are considered and inform all areas of Convention implementation and mine action programmes. The Committee observed that Mauritania had not provided updated information in its Article 7 Report on its efforts in implementation of Action #3 and would welcome further information in this regard (Action #3).
- 14. The OAP requests States to Ensure that national strategies and work plans for completion make provisions for a sustainable national capacity to address previously unknown mined areas, including newly mined areas discovered following completion. The Committee observed that Mauritania had not provided updated information in its Article 7 Report on its efforts in implementation in this regard and would welcome further information. (Action #26)

IV. Efficient and expedient implementation (OAP Actions #5, #9, #27)

- 15. The OAP requests States to keep national mine action standards up to date in accordance with the latest International Mine Action Standards (IMAS), adapt them to new challenges and employ best practices to ensure efficient and effective implementation. The Committee observed that Mauritania had not provided updated information in its Article 7 Report on its efforts in implementation in this regard and would welcome further information. (Action #5)
- 16. Mauritania reported on its efforts to establish and maintain an accurate and up-to-date information management system, including training of staff in IMSMA Core. (Action #9)

17. Mauritania reported on its efforts to improve the effectiveness and efficiency of survey and clearance, including by promoting the research, application and sharing of innovative technological means to this effect, including implementation of information management system. (Action #27)

V. Mine risk education and reduction (OAP Actions #28-32)

- 18. The OAP requests States to report on mine risk education and other risk reduction programmes in Article 7 reports, including the methodologies used, the challenges faced and the results achieved, with information disaggregated by gender and age. The Committee observed that while Mauritania reported on methodologies used. The Committee observed that Mauritania had not reported on the challenges faced and the results achieved, with information disaggregated by gender and age and would welcome further information in this regard. (Action #32)
- 19.The OAP requests States to Integrate mine risk education activities with wider humanitarian, development, protection and education efforts, as well as with ongoing survey, clearance and victim assistance activities to reduce the risk to the affected population and decrease their need for risk-taking. The Committee observed that while Mauritania had provided information in its Article 7 Report on its efforts to integrate mine risk education through organised theme meetings with teachers. The Committee observed that Mauritania had not provided updates on its efforts to integrate MRE/R into wider humanitarian, development, protection and education efforts, and would welcome further information in this regard. (Action #28)
- 20. The OAP requests States to provide context-specific mine risk education and reduction programmes to all affected populations and groups at risk. Ensure that such programmes are developed on the basis of a needs assessment, that they are tailored to the threat encountered by the population, and that they are sensitive to gender, age, disability and take the diverse needs and experiences of people in affected communities into account. The Committee observed that while Mauritania had provided information in its Article 7 Report on its efforts to provide risk education to all affected populations and groups at risk. The Committee observed that Mauritania had not provided information on its efforts to ensure that such programmes are developed on the basis of a needs assessment, that they are tailored to the threat encountered by the population, and that they are sensitive to gender, age, disability and take the diverse needs and experiences of people in affected communities into account and would welcome further information in this regard. (Action #29)
- 21.The OAP requests States to prioritise people most at risk by linking mine risk education and reduction programmes and messages directly to an analysis of available casualty and contamination data, an understanding of the affected population's behaviour, risk pattern and coping mechanisms, and, wherever possible, anticipated population movements. The Committee observed that while Mauritania had provided information on its efforts to prioritise people most at risk, including shepherds, nomads, fisher, and breeders. The Committee observed that Mauritania had not provided information on its efforts to link mine risk education and reduction programmes and messages directly to an analysis of available casualty and contamination data, an understanding of the affected population's behaviour, risk pattern and coping mechanisms, and, wherever possible, anticipated population movements and would welcome further information in this regard. (Action #30)
- 22. The OAP requests States to build national capacity to deliver mine risk education and reduction programmes with the ability to adapt to changing needs and contexts, including the delivery of such programmes to affected communities in the case that previously unknown mined areas are discovered. The Committee observed that while Mauritania had provided information on its efforts to build national capacity to deliver mine risk education and reduction programmes. The Committee observed that Mauritania had not provided updated information on its efforts to ensure that

national capacity has the ability to adapt to changing needs and contexts, including the delivery of such programmes to affected communities in the case that previously unknown mined areas are discovered in its Article 7 Report and would welcome further information in this regard. (Action #31)

VII. Challenges in implementation (OAP Action #8)

23. The Committee observed that Mauritania had not provided information on challenges in implementing the Convention and would welcome further information in this regard. (Action #8)
