STATUS OF IMPLEMENTATION – VICTIM ASSISTANCE

- 1. The Committee welcomes the submission by Mauritania of updated information on its victim assistance activities.
- 2. Based on the information provided, the Committee presents the following preliminary observations.

Mine casualties

- 3. Mauritania reported 5 new casualties in 2023 which has increased the total mine victims to 634, which 370 were killed and 264 persons have survived.
- 4. The Committee would welcome further information disaggregated by age, gender and disability on all mine victims including those occurred before 2018 as well as indirect victims.

VICTIM ASSISTANCE ACTIONS:

Strengthen partnerships and integrate victim assistance into broader national policies, plans and legal frameworks and designation of a government entity to oversee the integration (Action #33 and Actions #1 and #6)

5. Mauritania reported that the National Programme for Humanitarian Demining and Development (PNDHD) leads on coordination of victim assistance activities.

Develop and implement measurable, realistic, and time-bound national action plan (Action #33 and Action #2)

6. The Committee would welcome information on plans in place to oversee and measure progress and achievements of integrated plans, in relation to fulfilling Mauritania's commitments under the Convention and the OAP.

Removing barriers including physical, social, cultural, political, attitudinal and communication barriers to access such services (Action #33)

7. The Committee would welcome an update on progress made in this regard and in relation to lifting barriers that may hinder the participation of survivors and persons with disabilities in Mauritania.

Applying multi-sectoral efforts to ensure that the needs and rights of mine victims are effectively addressed in line with the Convention on the Rights of Persons with Disabilities (Action #34)

8. <u>The Committee would welcome information in application of multi-sectoral approach, in synergy</u> with provisions of the Convention on the Rights of Persons with Disabilities (CRPD).

Establish or strengthen of a centralised database / national information management system (Action #35 and Action #9)

- 9. Mauritania reported collecting data on casualties caused due to mines and that a total of 629 casualties have been recorded.
- 10. The Committee would welcome information on the integration of mine casualty data into relevant national databases, such as national disability database or injury surveillance registry.

Access to first aid and ongoing emergency medical care (Action #36)

- 11. Mauritania reported that the PNDHD has signed an agreement with the Ministry of Health concerning provision of assistive devices to mine survivors.
- 12. The Committee would welcome information on progress made as a result of the agreement between the PNDHD and the Ministry of Health.

Developing national referral mechanism (Action #37)

13. The Committee would welcome information on the status of a national referral mechanism and directory of services or plan to develop them to further facilitate mine victims' access to services.

Access to rehabilitation services including physiotherapy, assistive devices, and occupational therapy (Action #38)

- 14. Mauritania reported that the PNDHD has signed an agreement with the Ministry of Health concerning provision of assistive devices to mine survivors and services are provide in this regard by the National Orthopaedic and Functioning Rehabilitation Centre (CNORF).
- 15. <u>The Committee would also welcome further information on the number of mine survivors that</u> have received rehabilitation services in 2023.

Access to psychological and psychosocial services including peer-to-peer support (Action #38)

- 16. Mauritania reported the PNDHD through services provided by CNORF ensures the psychological needs of mine victims are met.
- 17. The Committee would welcome further information on availability psychosocial support including availability of peer-to-peer support and its inclusion into public healthcare policy/programme.

Access to social and economic inclusion services, including in rural and remote areas (Action #39)

18. The Committee would welcome information on progress made with regards to social and economic inclusion of mine survivors and their families including in rural and remote areas and information on the number of mine victims benefited from socio-economic assistance in 2023.

Taking measure for safety and protection of mine survivors in situations of risks and emergencies (Action #40)

19. The Committee would welcome information on measures that are in place or are planned to ensure the safety and protection of mine survivors in situations of risks and emergencies including humanitarian emergencies and natural disasters.

Strengthening inclusion and participation of mine victims and their representative organisations in all matters that affect them (Action #41 and Action #4)

20. The Committee would welcome information on progress made by Mauritania to facilitate inclusion and participation of mine survivors and their representative organisations to policies and programmes.

CROSS - CUTTING ACTIONS:

Demonstrate high levels of national ownership, including [...] by making financial and other commitments to implementation (Action #1)

- 21. Mauritania reported that national funds were allocated for training and recruitment of mine survivors.
- 22. The Committee would welcome further information on allocation of financial and other commitments, by the Government of Mauritania, to other areas of victim assistance activities.

Ensure that the different needs and perspectives of women, girls, boys and men are considered (Action #3)

23. <u>The Committee would welcome information on progress made in ensuring gender and diversity in victim assistance related plans and programmes.</u>

Challenges in implementation of Victim Assistance Commitments (Action #8)

24. The Committee would welcome further information on challenges faced by Mauritania in the provision of Victim Assistance and information on how the international community can assist Mauritania in fulfilling its Victim Assistance commitments under the Convention and the OAP.
